#### PRINCIPALS REPORT

Yesterday was a fabulous day for cross country. The track was dry, the sun was shining and the races all ran smoothly with no major injuries. I am very proud of all of our children who competed. Many were coughing and a bit unwell but gave it a shot all the same. Congratulations to you all! That hill looks terrifying but poses a great challenge. You all remembered that along with anxiety there is always bravery and many showed great resilience and determination. Talking with the senior class around our fears and wishes one commented that she didn't want to get last. Unfortunately, in every race, it doesn't matter if it is the Olympics or a friendly run at school, someone is always first and someone has to be last. Good on you to all those who placed but those of you who did come last and did it with a smile or (gritted teeth) have my utmost respect.

Thank you to those parents who found the time last week to attend the John Parsons presentation. Those who I have spoken to found it entertaining, enlightening and came away with more knowledge and understanding on keeping our children safe in the scary cyber dimension.

John's key message for staff was that we should no longer be separating digital citizenship from citizenship. We need to be teaching our children the life skills, key competencies and values that demand they be a 'good' citizen in every aspect of their life. The format you use to communicate and stay informed is irrelevant.

He likened staying safe on the internet to staying safe at the local park. You might greet and share pleasantries with a stranger but you would never give them your personal details. John questioned the children about what they would do if a stranger took them by the hand and said 'Come with me'. They all had very clear ideas about kicking and screaming etc. He then pointed out the similarities of following links or instructions from strangers on the internet. This poses the same threats only worse because any offenders have anonymity and could convincingly pose as anyone.

One of the riskiest behaviours for anyone using online communication is that access to your information is available to anyone who cares to find it. It can be altered and manipulated to suit all sorts of purpose. John warned the children about protecting their identity and personal details. He also discussed the fact that predatory individuals will look for vulnerability and advised the children never to post pictures of themselves alone in bedrooms, bathrooms or in pyjamas. John informed the children to always trust their gut instinct. If they ever felt uncomfortable about images, conversations, questions or how much someone knew about them they should immediately shark their device and show an adult they trust. He suggested that as parents or Teachers we should screenshot and keep files of any of this information. This could be an unkind snapchat from a peer or a conversation that made a child feel uncomfortable. Small, seemingly insignificant things can build a bigger picture and raise concerns when we monitor and collect posts.

There was a huge amount of information and some of John's stories had a shock factor that made children and adults sit up and listen. The internet is an amazing asset and if children know the basics of staying safe and use their family values as filters we should all stay safe. John gave us way more information than I can share with you but we do have copies of his book here at school should anyone want to borrow them. I suggest you do.
